



It might be early days but Coastcare's saturated steam weeder is returning some pretty impressive results.

Six weeks after the launch of the state government funded project that enabled the purchase of this machine we're witnessing a dramatic reduction to the carpets of Mothers of Millions.

As the weeks pass it's hard to contain the excitement.

Our test sites (staked for photo-monitoring) will be observed over the long-term with assistance from Indigiscapes to ensure outcomes are correctly recorded. Three of our four sites have already been treated twice along with one Bushcare zone with others to follow.

Intensive herbicide spraying on asparagus infestation around the foreshore over time left dead zones where only weeds (in our case Mothers of Million) flourished. Restoring ecosystem health through chemical-free weeding and revegetation is helping repair the landscape. To date we've planted over 650 native ground covers, grasses, shrubs and trees and been blessed with frequent showers.

Our thanks to QYAC rangers who've worked with us to gain their Certificate of Operator Competency on the weeder. There's no doubt operator skill at targeting weeds and avoiding natives takes concentration, but it's worth the effort.

Groundwater testing expanded around closed landfill site

New test wells are being drilled around the Laurie Burns Recreation Reserve this week to enable expanded groundwater sampling in response to concerns raised by Coastcare over contamination from the closed landfill site.

Redland City Council engaged consulting firm GHD to undertake the works which also include surface water sampling in the Melaleuca wetlands.

Ecologists spent time on island this week monitoring habitat for endangered species as part of investigations into recorded heavy metal contamination.
