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Help restore shellfish reefs in Moreton Bay An information night at Oasis on Friday 8 September

Did you know that 96 percent of the bay's shellfish reefs have been destroyed? Hear how this is being reversed through community working with First Nations People, scientists and universities.

Robbie is a Local Wynnum man and passionate advocate for restoring Moreton Bay's fish habitat. As President of OzFish's Moreton Bay Chapter he's run the Wynnum Manly Seafood Festival, educated a vast array of community in fish habitat values and successfully diverted hundreds of cubic meters of oyster shell from landfill to restore shellfish reefs in Pumicestone Passage.

Ecosystem Services of Shellfish Reefs: Nature's Engineers

Shellfish are recognised as "ecosystem engineers" due to their remarkable capacity to enhance marine environments.

Water Filtration - Shellfish are prodigious filter feeders, removing impurities and excess nutrients from the water. This filtration process helps to improve water clarity and quality, benefiting both marine life and human activities.

Habitat Creation - Shellfish reefs provide complex structures that offer refuge, breeding grounds, and foraging habitats for a diverse array of marine species, including fish and invertebrates that contribute to increased biodiversity and healthy marine populations.

Sediment Stabilisation -The intricate formations of shellfish reefs help bind sediment particles, reducing erosion and stabilising the seabed, vital for maintaining clear waters and preventing sediment runoff into sensitive areas.

Carbon and Nutrient Sequestration - Shellfish reefs play a role in sequestering carbon and other nutrients, helping to mitigate the impacts of climate change and promoting nutrient cycling within the ecosystem.



The ROB is a wire mesh gabion basket that is filled with recycled and sanitised oyster shells, making the ideal home for baby oysters to live and grow.

Dumped sand on Wetlands Beach a source of community concern



Coastcare acknowledges community concern over the two mounds of sand left seaward of the dune fence on the northern section of the Melaleuca Wetland's beach after June's renourishment.

A quote has been sought for the relocation of the two large piles to be moved behind the fence in the depleted southern vegetated zone, just north of the creek. There's optimism the mounds will be restored as originally intended before the storm season. Unfortunately, this minor, but important work was unable to be completed before 30th June, due to contractor timing and machine constraints.

The roll-out of the 2020 SEMP or Shoreline Erosion Management Plan recommendations <u>Coochiemudlo</u> <u>Island Shoreline Erosion Management Plan</u> was enabled by Redland City Council budgeted operational spend.

Thanks to Healthy Land and Water for supporting Coastcare with funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program for the restoration project's substantial revegetation. Over 2,300 tubestock were planted by Coastcarers to increase the resilience of the southern section of the wetlands dune.
